Day 3

## Day 4

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### What's the best party you can imagine?

That is going to be the question of the day. Grab a piece of paper and a writing utensil, or if you have access to some sort of recording device (like a smart phone voice memo app), record your interviews (if you do choose to record, be sure to get permission from the person you're recording).

Interview at least five people of varying ages and ask them, "What's the best party you can imagine?" If they need more prompts, ask them about the location, the decorations, would there be a theme, who would be invited, would there be music and dancing, what kind of food would be served, etc.

Once you've finished interviewing everyone, compile your answers. (If you recorded them, jot down the highlights of each person's answers.) Did you find any common themes? If so, circle those. Then go back and highlight the answers that sound super fun to you, but also are doable. Is this a party you could pull off, perhaps with your family's help? Now hold on to the sheet until tomorrow. . .



## Day 5

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### Celebrate what God will do.

Pull out your party planning sheet from the day before and take a look at your plan. Is this something you could reasonably pull off before the summer ends and you go back to school? If not, make some changes and scale it back a little. Then call on your family. Explain that you want to have a party focused on the theme of JOY. Show them your plan and divide up the tasks. Don't forget to pick a date and time that works for everyone. Decide if you want to keep it just a family party, or if you can invite some friends as well. Whatever you decide is great—just make sure you take some time celebrating what God has done, is doing, and will do in your lives! Now, go have a party!
